Price; Superintendent of Municipal Electric Light and Water Plant, Harry Monsell; Official Newspaper, The Suffolk Times; Depository for village moneys received by the treasurer, People's National Bank; Village Assessor, Herbert Rackett.

Regular monthly meetings of the Board of Trustees will be held in the Village office, the second Monday in each month at 7:30 p. m. The Board also voted to adopt daylight saving time in the village in accordance with New York City and the Long Island Railroad.

It was also decided to have the Tyfon air-horn which is at present temporarily installed at the Municipal Light Plant on trail as a fire alarm signal, permanently installed with the necessary air tank compressor and other needed equipment.

Mott Heath, of Greenport, was notified, and Dr. Peterson, of Cutchogue, was summoned to care for the injured brother. An inquest was held by Coroner Heath on Tuesday afternoon at the Cutchogue Fire House.

James Parker Wickham was born in Cutchogue, a son of Mrs. Corn Wickham. He is survived by his mother; his wife, Margaret; two young sons, James Wickham, Jr., and Steven Lake Wickham, and two brothers, John and Henry Wickham, of Cutchogue.
